The Council met in regular session with Mayor Fourtner presiding. The roll call showed the following Councilmen present, Chandler, Roscoe, W. C. Hansen, Hansen and Clausen.

The Treasurers report was read and ordered filed.

A Claim for Damages against the City of Edmonds <sup>for \$50</sup> which was caused from the breaking of a cover of a water meter box, located in front of the Gateway Cafe was referred to the City Attorney. Claim was filed by Abraham Bedier, of Alderwood Manor.

A letter received from the Division of Municipal Corporations, was read. Chapter 115, Laws of 1941 provides in part as follows: "\*\*\*\*\*and each city councilman may be paid for attending council meetings in amount not exceeding \$5.00 per meeting, and for not more than two meetings per month, as the city council may fix by ordinance." An ordinance providing compensation for city Councilmen under the above quoted statute must be passed before the election of any officers mentioned in the ordinance. We are of the opinion that city councilmen who were elected subsequent to the passage of the budget ordinance providing salaries for city councilmen, are entitled to those salaries

A letter from R. M. Wade & Company on the purchase of a new pump and equipment was referred to the water committee.

A motion was moved and seconded that the City Attorney be instructed to draw up an emergency Ordinance for the erection of an Observation Tower at the Northeast corner of third and main streets at a cost of \$350 for labor and material, and to provide for maintenance for this year. Motion carried.

Mr. Pointer of Pointer Williamette Co. offered his equipment to help move the tower now located at the Ferry Dock so the post may be butnā operation until the new post is erected. He also offered some lumber and windows for the erection of the new tower.

Dewey Leyda also volunteered to do the electric wiring for the new observation post.

There being no further business on motion the meeting adjourned.

By a unanimous vote of the Council a motion was moved and seconded that emergency Ordinance # 545 be adopted. Motion carried.

ORDINANCE # 545.

An Ordinance providing for the purchase of material for, and the construction of, an air craft warning observation post, or tower, and the maintenance thereof; during 1943, in the City of Edmonds; providing for the issuance of emergency warrants in payment thereof, and declaring an emergency.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS:

Section 1: That the City of Edmonds shall purchase the necessary material for and shall construct an air craft warning observation post, or tower, in said city of Edmonds, for use by the aircraft warning observers of the Civilian Defense during the present war emergency, and shall maintain same during 1943.

Section 2: That by reason of the existing war emergency and the necessity for maintaining such an aircraft warning post for the observation and reporting of approaching enemy aircraft an emergency is hereby declared to exist with reference thereto which could not reasonably have been foreseen at the time of the making of the last annual budget.

Section 3: That the estimated cost and expenditure required for the material and labor, in connection with the construction of such observation post and for the maintenance of such post during 1943, is the sum of Three Hundred Fifty (\$350.00) Dollars, which sum shall be paid by the issuance of emergency warrants drawn therefor.

Section 4: This Ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and Publication as required by law.

The Council met in regular session with Mayor Fourtner presiding. The roll call showed the following Councilmen present, Chandler, Roscoe, Hansen, Jones, Savage, Hansen and Clausen.

William Carter of Seattle Heights asked the Council about joining their fire district with the Edmonds Fire District so their firemen may obtain Firemen's Insurance from the State. This matter was laid over until the Fire Chief M. C. Engels had been consulted.

Attorney O. D. Anderson presented to the Council an easement from Ralph V. Hard to install a trunk sewer line across his property on Third Street.

The following agreement between the City of Edmonds and Pointer Williamette Company was drawn up by the City Attorney.

#### AGREEMENT

This Agreement, entered into by and between Edmonds, A municipal corporation, of Snohomish County, Washington, hereinafter called "the City", and Pointer-Williamette Co, a corporation, hereinafter called "the Company",

#### WITNESSETH:

That the Company is presently engaged in the operation of a plant on the waterfront, in said City, wherein it is performing war contracts with the U. S. Army covering the construction of barges, and it is necessary, in the public service, that that portion of Yost Admiral Way from the South line of Dayton Street, in said City, South to a point opposite station 1018+82.5 on the Great Northern right-of-way main line, be closed in order that such right-of-way may be available for the necessary use of the Company; and further in order that the public may be barred from access to such plant for obvious military reasons.

That in order to effect such closing it is hereby agreed, by and between the parties hereto, as follows: that for the duration of the present war Yost Admiral Way, from the South line of Dayton Street South approximately four hundred feet, more or less, to a point opposite station 1018+82.5 on the Great Northern main line right of-way may be closed by the Company, and such portion of said highway so closed may be made use of by the company as an integral part of its plant.

That as a consideration for the closing of said highway and the use thereof by the Company the Company agrees to establish and maintain in a condition suitable for traffic a substitute or alternate roadway leading from Dayton Street South to a connection with Yost Admiral Way Southerly of the portion of the latter road so closed. The Company further agrees that upon the termination of the present war, or sooner if it ceases operation of its plant at Edmonds, to restore the portion of Yost Admiral Way so closed to a condition as good as obtained prior to the closing thereof, and to remove all structures therefrom.

It is Further Agreed that the Company will indemnify and hold harmless the City from any and all claims, costs, charges, damages or suits arising out of or in any way resulting from the closing of said highway, or from any negligence or carelessness in the opening and maintenance of the substitute or alternate roadway provided for herein.

Mr. Bentley reported the sewer at the foot of Dayton street had been broken. Mayor Fourtner stated that the Insurance Company for Pointer Williamette would repair the damage which was done from driving of piles.

A report from Dewey Leyda on the completion of the Observation tower showed a total cost of \$48.81, to Crow Hardware, 7.48, Stevens Lumber \$30.08, Engels Insurance Agency \$11.25 for Liability Insurance for one year, which covers anyone who is injured while on the premises.

A motion was moved and seconded that the Council extend a vote of thanks to Dewey Leyda and the Committee also to those who donated their time and material for the consrtuction of the Obervation Tower. Motion carried. The following donated their time and material, C. J. Hildebrand, O. A. Bir-sbrauer, A. B. Miller, E. M. Moore, A. J. Armes, R. H. Doty, L. S. Vincent, Thomas Lawson, George Hicks, Dewey Leyda, Pointer-Williamette co. Quality Shingle Co, Crow Hardware, Reliable Hardware, Edmonds Furniture Co, Leyda Electric and Radio and the Stevens Lumber Co.

A letter from County commissioner, Jack Ballew states that if the City of Edmonds intends to purchase gravel and they desire to make their own loading arrangements, pit run gravel would be 5¢ per cubic yard and crushed rock out of the stock pile at the pit would be 50¢ per cubic yard.

A motion was moved and seconded that the council give Mr. Fourtner permission to open up Walnut street between seventh and eighth streets, about three hundred feet more or less. The city agrees to gravel the same when it is put to grade as near as possible. Motion carried.

The widening of road on Yost Admiral way to provide room for two vehicles to pass was referred to the street committee.

The Clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Quiett that a license fee of \$2.50 a month would have to be paid to the City Treasurer for operating a dance hall, and he must furnish his own policemen, also if any city policing is needed to police the outside of the hall, he must reimburse the City for the same.

The Clerk was instructed to write a letter to the Washington State Planning Council stating the increase in population since 1940, in order to obtain monies from the state.

A letter from the State Auditor was read by the Clerk, stating that the City of Edmonds had received \$606.85 from the State, because of Edmonds showing a 3% or more increase in population since the 1940 Federal Census. This money is to be put in a fund called the "State Aid Fund", and expended only for salaries and wages, supplies, material and equipment for police and fire protection, health and sanitation, library and park and civilian defense. Expenditures of monies maybe made without regard to budget laws for 1943 but for 1944 and 45 shall be provided for in accordance with budget laws.

The necessary papers were received from the War Production Board authorizing the City of Edmonds to purchase a Pump and Motor, also the material for installing, at a cost not to exceed \$698. A Motion was moved and seconded that the Clerk publish in the local paper, a notice to call for bids for a Pomona Pump and Motor. Bids to be opened April 20, 1943, at 8 o'clock. Motion carried.

The Mayor read a letter to the Council pertaining to the licensing of taverns which states because of the State collecting a license the cities could not. After a discussion of licensing other amusement places a Motion was moved and seconded that the enforcing of licensing taverns and amusement places be laid over for further investigation. Motion carried.

George Yost came before the Council about a loading and unloading zone for the busses. After a discussion the Council decided to lay this over until the next meeting so that all parties concerned may have a chance to voice their opinion.

Mr. Bently reported that the Sewer in the alley between fourth and fifth street south of Dayton was filled up with sand. The Mayor reported that work was being done to remede this condition. This was referred to the street and sewer committee.

There being no further business on motion the meeting adjourned.

ORDINANCE NO 546

An Ordinance prohibiting minors under Sixteen (16) years of age from being on the streets, avenues, alleys, docks, or other public places, within the City of Edmonds, during certain hours of the night and prescribing penalties for the violation thereof.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS:

Section 1: It shall be and is hereby declared unlawful for any person of persons, male or female, under the age of Sixteen (16) years, to congregate, loiter, or be upon the streets, avenues, alleys, docks, or other public places, within the limits of the City of Edmonds, during the months of May June, July, August or September, between the hours of ten o'clock P. M., and five o'clock A. M. and during the remaining months of the year between the hours of nine-thirty o'clock P. M., and five o'clock A. M., unless such person or persons shall be accompanied by his, her or their parent, guardian or other person having the legal custody of such minor, or some other member of the family over twenty-one years of age, providing that this Ordinance shall not apply to such person or persons who are required to be in or upon such public place by reason of actual employment.

Section 2: The time herein referred to shall mean United States Pacific War Time.

Section 3: Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance or and parent, guardian or other person having the legal custody or care of such minor person or persons, described in Section 1 of this Ordinance, and who shall permit or suffer such minor person or persons to go or be in or upon any of the streets or other public places, as aforesaid, within the times mentioned in Section 1 hereof, except as therein provided, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars or be confined in the City Jail for a period not exceeding ten (10) days or shall be punished by both such fine or imprisonment.

"Section 21-A: The City Council of the City of Edmonds may, in the case of shortage of water, or for any other reasonable cause, make an order forbidding or limiting the use of water in said city, or in any portion thereof, for irrigation or sprinkling purposes, and may at its discretion, make such order at any time. Notice of such order shall be given by publication in the official newspaper of said city, not less than one day before the effective date of such order. In the event of a violation of any such order the water may be turned off from the premises and the same shall not be turned on again until the owner or occupant of the premises shall have paid to the Water Department a charge of three dollars (\$3.00), for inspection and turning the water off and on."

Section 2: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication as required by law.

Commencing at the intersection of 6th and Daley Streets in the City of Edmonds, Snohomish County, Washington; thence Northerly along 6th Street to Glen Street; thence East along Glen Street to 7th Street; thence North along 7th Street from Glen Street to the North City limits; thence along the Beverly Park - Edmonds County Road, also known as Snohomish County Bond Project No 34, as laid out, constructed and paved under County Engineer's Survey No 640, and extending Easterly, Northerly and Northeasterly along said road to the point where said road intersects the East line of Government Lot 1, Section 18, Township 27, North of Range 4, E. W. M.

Also all interest of the grantor in any existing additions or extensions to said pipe line and all meters, valves or other appurtenances thereto, it being the intention of the grantor by this instrument to convey all interest which it may own in and to its entire water system now owned by it in Edmonds and North Edmonds, together with any and all appurtenances to the same.

Mayor Fourtner reported that Pointer-Williamette was building another way on the South side of their plant, that Mr. Weber has wood and other obstruction on the property. A motion was moved and seconded that the Mayor and Attorney notify Mr. Weber to move the wood and obstruction from the Waterway Track. Motion carried.

Street Superintendent reported that he had torn out the culvert on third street south, to prevent the water from washing out the street. He also reported that the water pipe had been laid along second street. Water Superintendent R. H. Doty reported the Yost well was not producing the water that it has in the past.

A motion was moved and seconded that the Puget Sound Power & Light Co. be given permission to remove the shades from the street lights. Motion carried.

There being no further business a motion was moved and seconded the meeting adjourn. Motion carried.

Chief of Police reported he had received complaints from the taverns of his taking intoxicated persons from the taverns. After a discussion with the Councilmen he was advised to use his own judgment and abide by the State law.

Chief of Police W. C. Hansen reported the F. B. I. had been in touch with him about the Juvenile delinquency. They suggested some kind of recreation should be provided for the young people. Mayor Fourtner appointed a committee of three to meet with the Chief of Police and the Police Judge, McGibbon, Clausen and girl supervisor from the High School.

Chief of Police W. C. Hansen was given the authority to hire help on Saturday nights and holidays when necessary.

The question of parking on Main Street from fifth street east was again brought up at the Council meeting. After some discussion this was laid over until the next meeting of the Council.

Councilman Jones reported that the condition at the City Park was not satisfactory. He is to get in touch with other members of the park board and see what can be done about this condition.

There being no further business a motion was moved and seconded the meeting adjourn. Carried.
