

A motion was moved and seconded that the attorney and engineer get in touch with the State Highway Department and draw up a franchise to lay water pipe from the south City limits to the Union Oil gas Station. Motion carried.

Mayor Fourtner reported on the taking of the census. After some discussion it was decided if the City has to hire someone to take the census it would not pay to have it done. The Mayor also reported the Fourth Interceptor Command had asked to have the lights ^{turned} on at the Observation Tower. It was decided to wait until they heard from George Hicks.

Chief of Police W. C. Hansen asked if there was a law that requires a Matron when he has a woman in jail. This was laid over until the next meeting. He also asks in regards to the curfew law if something could be done on nights when the Schools had activities, as the children were late in going home.

The subject of parking on Main Street between fifth and Sixth streets was discussed, also the piling of boxes on the sidewalk. It was decided that the Chief of Police should enforce the law.

A letter was read from the State Department of Health which shows that the water conforms with the U. S. Bacteriological Standard for drinking water.

A motion was moved and seconded that Gordon Magill and Donald Foss be given credit of \$46.30 each on their water bills, the cost of the pipe which they installed. Motion carried.

Water Superintendent reported on the drawing up of a franchise for the laying of a water line along the State Highway South of the City limits. A motion was moved and seconded to rescind the previous motion. A motion was moved and seconded that we obtain a franchise from the State to lay a one inch pipe line on the west side of the Highway for a distance of 1000 feet South of the South City limits and a four inch pipe line on the east side of the highway, South to the termination of the Seattle water line. Vote Chandler, yes, Roscoe, yes, McGibbon, yes, Jones, no, Savage, yes, Hansen, yes, Clausen, no. Motion carried.

Water Superintendent reported to the Council that we are going to need more water. That the Yost well was not producing what had been anticipated after the cleaning and repairing of the well. A motion was moved and seconded that the Water Superintendent prepare a report on the water situation and contact the different well diggers on what should be done to produce more water. Motion carried.

A motion was moved and seconded that the Water Superintendent sell the platform which is not being used for \$5. Motion carried.

Mayor Fourtner reported that Mr. Gard offered the City \$350 for lots 19 & 20 in Block 122. This was laid over until the next meeting of the Council.

The Mayor asked if the Council wanted to sell the reservoir on ninth and Main streets. The Council decided not to sell.

A motion was moved and seconded that the Council sell lots 21 and 22 in Block 40 to George Anderson for \$40.01 per lot. Motion carried.

Otto Sorenson, a member of the Library Board came before the Council in regards to the heating of the library for next winter. A motion was moved and seconded that Councilman McGibbon have a survey made of the heating system and work with the library board on the matter. Motion carried. Mr. Sorenson also asked that the City Jail be moved from the library Building.

Chief of Police W. C. Hansen reported that the girls from the High School had not reported to him in regards to a recreation center. He also reported that several citizens had asked if the skating rink could be opened for the young folks. Councilman Clausen stated that we could spend the taxpayers money only for the cost of the City Government.

Councilman Hansen reported that Henry Allen would like permission to move a building from Bell to Maple Street. A motion was moved and seconded that Henry Allen be given permission to move the building from Bell to Maple street according to the City Ordinance. Motion Carried.

There being no further business a motion was moved and seconded the meeting adjourn. Carried.

A motion was moved and seconded that Mr. Hill design a can and report on same at the next meeting of the Council. Motion carried.

A motion was moved and seconded that Henry Allen bring his contractor before the Clerk, and show his bond for 1944, before moving the building on Bell street. Motion carried.

The Clerk read a report of the Street Superintendent, on the condition of the sidewalks. A motion was moved and seconded that the property owners be notified of the City Ordinance governing the repair of sidewalks, also if they did not make the repair the City would and the property owners would be charged for the expense. Motion carried.

A motion was moved and seconded that the Clerk notify Mr. Airis and Howlett of the damage of their trees to the Sewer, that they cooperate with the City and remove the trees, if the property owners do not take care of them the City will and the expense will be charged to the property owners. Councilman Clausen reported that the Alderwood Water District offered to supply the City of Edmonds with water in case of an emergency for 14 cents per hundred Cubic feet and a stand by charge of \$25 per month. The Water Superintendent is in favor of the proposition. A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by Chandler that the Clerk write to the Alderwood Water District and thank them for their courtesy and their proposition will be considered at a later date.

A motion was made by Clausen and seconded by Savage that the Chief of Police be authorized to have the street signs painted by the County at a cost of 75 cents apiece. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Roscoe that the street Supt. be authorized to make the repairs of the sidewalks as he finds time. A roll call vote of the Council showed Chandler, yes, Roscoe, yes, McGibbon, no, Jones, no, Savage, no, Hansen, no and Clausen no.

Miller is as follows: 70 lineal feet of 10 inch finished well, drilling, pipe, at 12.00 per foot, 840.00, 6 days development work at 30.00 per day, 180.00, 8 lineal feet of screen at well site, 39.25 per foot 314.00, making a total of \$1334.00. Work to be started by June 10, and completed on June 30, 1944.

A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by McGibbon that the clerk call for bids for a $1\frac{1}{2}$ ton truck, 1938 model or later. Bids to be opened at the next meeting of the Council. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Jones and seconded by Roscoe that the Street Supt. be authorized to purchase the die and vice which is needed for cutting of pipe. Motion carried.

There being no further business a motion was moved and seconded the meeting adjourn. Carried.

ORDINANCE NO. 549

An Ordinance relating to the construction and reconstruction of sidewalks in the City of Edmonds and providing for the payment therefor by the owners of abutting property.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS:

Section 1: Definitions. The term "Street", as used in this Ordinance, shall include boulevard, avenue, street, alley, way, lane, square or place. The term "Sidewalk" shall include any and all structures or forms of street improvement included in the space between the street margin and the roadway.

Section 2: Whenever a portion not longer than one block in length of any street in the City of Edmonds shall not be improved by the construction of a sidewalk thereon, or the sidewalk thereon shall have become unfit or unsafe for purposes of public travel, and such street, adjacent to both ends of said portion, shall be so improved and in good repair and the City Council of the City of Edmonds shall be resolution find that the improvement of such portion of such Street by the construction or reconstruction of a sidewalk thereon is necessary for the public safety and convenience the city, burden and expense of constructing or reconstructing such sidewalk shall devolve upon the property directly abutting upon such portion; provided, that such abutting property shall not be charged with any costs of construction or reconstruction under this Ordinance in excess of Fifty per cent of the valuation of such abutting property, exclusive of improvements thereon, according to the valuation last placed upon it for purposes of general taxation.

Section 3: Whenever the City Council of the City of Edmonds shall have adopted such Resolution it shall cause a notice to be served on the owner of the property directly sbutting on such portion of such street, instruct-said owner to construct or reconstruct a sidewalk, on such portion, in

accordance with the plans and specifications which shall be attached to such notice. Such notice shall be deemed sufficiently served if delivered in person to the owner or if left at the home of such owner with a person of suitable age and discretion then resident therein, or with an agent of such owner, authorized to collect rentals on such property, or, if such owner is a non-resident of the State of Washington, by mailing a copy to his last known address, or if such owner be unknown, or if his address be unknown, then by posting a copy in a conspicuous place at such portion of said street where such improvement is to be made. Such notice shall specify a reasonable time within which such construction or reconstruction shall be made and shall state that in case such owner shall fail to make the same within such time, the City of Edmonds will proceed to make the same through its Street Superintendent, and that said Street Superintendent will report to the City Council, at a subsequent date, to be definitely stated in said Notice an Assessment Roll showing the lot or parcel of land directly abutting on such portion of such Street so improved, the cost of such improvement, and the name of the owner, if known, and that the City Council of the City of Edmonds at the time in said notice or at the time or times to which the same may be adjourned, to hear any and all protests against the proposed assessment. Upon the expiration of the time fixed within which the owner is required to construct or reconstruct such sidewalk, if the owner has failed to perform such work, the City may proceed to perform such work, and the Street Superintendent of the City of Edmonds performing such work shall, within the time fixed in the notice, report to the said City Council an Assessment Roll showing the lot or parcel of land directly abutting on such portion of such street so improved, the cost of such work, and the name of the owner, if known. The City Council of the City of Edmonds shall at the time in such notice designated, or at an adjourned time or times, assess the cost of such improvement against said property and shall fix the time and manner for payment thereof, which said assessment shall become a lien upon said property, and shall be collected in the manner as is provided by law for collection of special assessments under Chapter 27, Title 60, Remington's Revised Statutes of Washington.

Section 4: For the purposes of this Ordinance all property having a frontage upon the sides or margins of any street shall be deemed to be abutting property and such property shall be chargeable, as provided by this Ordinance, for all costs of construction or reconstruction or any form of sidewalk improvement between the margin of said street and the roadway lying in front of and adjacent to said property.

Section 5: Ordinance #278 of the City of Edmonds be and the same is hereby repealed.

Section 6: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION # 111

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS to improve the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds, from a point twenty-seven (27) feet West of Ninth Street to a point one hundred fifty (150) feet East of Ninth Street, in said city, by the construction of a six inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer, together with the necessary drainage, man-holes, catch basins and other appurtenances necessary to make a complete improvement; creating an Assessment District; creating a Local Improvement District Fund therefor; providing that the payment for said improvement be made by special assessment on the property in said District under the mode of payment by bonds.

1. That it is the intention of the City Council of the City of Edmonds, State of Washington, to improve the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds, from a point twenty-seven (27) feet West of Ninth Street to a point one hundred fifty (150) feet East of Ninth Street, in said city, by the construction of a six inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer, together with the necessary drainage, man-holes, catch basins and other appurtenances necessary to make a complete improvement.

2. That the cost and expense of all labor and material required to make a complete improvement, the fixed estimate and all other expense of every kind shall be made by special assessment; a Local Improvement District shall be established embracing as near as may be all the property specially benefited by such improvement, and such specially benefited property shall be assessed to pay for the entire cost of such improvement.

3. All persons who may desire to object to the improvement herein mentioned are hereby notified to appear at the Council Chambers in the City Hall, in the City of Edmonds, Washington, at a meeting of the said Council on the 5th day of September, 1944, at the hour of eight o'clock P. M. of said day then and there to present their objections thereto, if any they have.

4. The City Engineer of said City of Edmonds is hereby directed to submit to the City Council, at or prior to said 5th day of September, 1944, the estimated cost and expense of the improvement, in this Resolution mentioned, and a statement of the proportionate amount thereof which shall be borne by the property within the proposed Improvement District; and a statement of the aggregate assessed valuation of the real estate, exclusive of improvements, within said proposed Improvement District according to the valuation last placed upon it for general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts, or parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited thereby, and the estimated amount of the cost and expense of such improvement to be borne by each lot, tract, parcel of land or other property.

Passed by the City Council of the City of Edmonds this first day of August, 1944, and approved the same date.

The Clerk received copies of the Franchise for the laying of water pipe along the State Highway. Hearing on franchise is set for October 10, 1944. This was turned over to the City Attorney for filing and posting at the County Auditor's Office.

Engineer Sievers reported on the extending of sewer in Block 77. He stated that the assessed valuation, (estimated at \$950) was not high enough to warrant the cost of construction. He also stated that we still have the State Health Department to deal with, they are requiring a sewer to protect the Interstate Water Carriers.

A RESOLUTION DECLARING THE INTENTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS to improve the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds, from a point twenty-seven (27) feet West of Ninth Street to a point two hundred seventy (270) feet East of Ninth Street, in said City, by the construction of a six inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer, together with the necessary drainage, man-holes, catch basins and other appurtenances necessary to make a complete improvement; creating an Assessment District; creating a Local Improvement District Fund therefor; providing that the payment of one-half of the cost of said improvement be made out of the General Fund of the City of Edmonds and that the payment for the remaining one-half of said improvement be made by Special Assessment on the property in said District under the mode of payment by Bonds.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS:

1. That it is the intention of the City Council of the City of Edmonds, State of Washington, to improve the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds, from a point twenty-seven (27) feet West of Ninth Street to a point two hundred seventy (270) feet East of Ninth Street, in said City, by the construction of a six inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer, together with the necessary drainage, man-holes, catch basins and other appurtenances necessary to make a complete improvement,
2. That one-half of the cost and expense of all labor and material required to make a complete improvement, the fixed estimate and all other expenses of every kind shall be made out of the General Fund of the City of Edmonds, and the remaining one-half of such cost and expense shall be made by Special Assessment; a Local Improvement District shall be established embracing, as near as may be, all the property specially benefited by such improvement, and such specially benefited property shall be assessed to pay for one-half of the entire cost of such improvement.
3. All persons who may desire to object to the improvement herein mentioned are hereby notified to appear at the Council Chambers in the City Hall, in the City of Edmonds, Washington, at a meeting of the said Council on the 5th day of December, 1944, at the hour of eight o'clock P. M., of said day then and there to present their objections thereto, if any they have.
4. The City Engineer of said City of Edmonds is hereby directed to submit to the City Council, at or prior to said 5th day of December, 1944, the estimated cost and expense of the improvement, in this Resolution mentioned, and a statement of the proportionate amount thereof which shall be borne by the property within the proposed Improvement District; and a statement of the aggregate assessed valuation of the real estate, exclusive of improvement, within said proposed Improvement District according to the valuation last placed upon it for general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts, or parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited thereby, and the estimated amount of the cost and expense of such improvement to be borne by each lot, tract, parcel of land or other property.

The Council met in regular session with Mayor Fourtner presiding. The roll call showed the following Councilmen present, Chandler, Roscoe, McGibbon, Savage, Hansen and Clausen.

A motion was made by Savage and seconded by Chandler that the bills which were approved by the finance committee, for labor on the street \$64 and on the water for \$20, to Ray McKeever be allowed. Motion carried.

A letter was read by the Clerk from Frances E. Anderson in regards to the appointment of Mrs. A. M. Williams as librarian for the Edmonds City Library. A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Roscoe that the Council approve the appointment. Motion carried.

A report was read from the State Department of Health on two water samples which were approved for drinking water.

The Councilmen selected the following persons to serve on the election board for the City General Election December 5th, first ward, Mrs. Little, Allen and McGinness, Second Ward, Mrs. Boshart, Hicks and McClenahan, third ward, Mrs. Telfer, Clausen and Hansen.

Miss Caspers and Mr. Gerdon came before the Council and asked if something could be done in regards to the drainage on their property. Mr. Gerdon stated that the pipe that was put in by the W. P. A. two years ago had been broken, he suggested digging up of this pipe and new pipe re-laid. Mayor Fourtner referred this matter to the street committee and the street Supt.

Mayor Fourtner reported that the State Engineer had been out to look over the two railroad crossings. He stated the crossing at the Ferry Dock was not very dangerous but that the one on Dayton Street was a dangerous crossing. He suggested the use of a flood light which would show until the trains had passed. Councilman McGibbon reported that the Chamber of Commerce had received a letter from the Railroad Co. that they were sending out representatives to look these crossings over and they will meet with the Chamber of Commerce and the City Council.

Street Superintendent Doty reported that he had installed the catch-basin on third to take care of the drainage on Mr. Stubb's property. Chief of Police Hansen reported that he had complaints from Ingar Kjoson about the loading of passengers and driving the busses on the Richfield Oil property

Chandler made a motion that we contact the property owners at fifth and Dayton streets in regards to the drainage. Councilman Clausen made a substitute motion that the street superintendent get in touch with the Asphalt Co. in regards to the price for the filling in the low place at fifth and Dayton street, which will illiminate the curb and gutter. Chandler withdrew his motion. Clausen motion was seconded by Roscoe. Motion carried.

Water superintendent Doty reported that a house was being built 95 feet from the water pump house. A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Roscoe that the Clerk write to the State Health Department about this condition. Motion carried. A motion was made by McGibbon that we get information from the Health department in regards to building near our water districts so this will not happen again.

Councilman McGibbon reported that the Richfield Service Station was dumping their drainage oil in the alley. A motion was made by Clausen and seconded by Roscoe that the Clerk notify Richfield Service that he must clean up the mess. Motion carried.

Ordinance No. 550 was read before the City Council.
ORDINANCE NO 550.

An Ordinance providing for the improvement of the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds from a point 27 feet West of Ninth Street to a point 270 feet East of Ninth Street, in said City, by the construction of a six-inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer, together with the necessary drainage, man holes, catch basins and other appurtenances necessary to make a complete improvement all in accordance with Resolution No. 112 of the City of Edmonds: creating an Assessment District; creating a Local Improvement District Fund therefor, and providing that payment for one-half of the costs and expenses of such improvement be made by special assessment on said District under the mode of payment by bonds, and the remaining one-half be charged against and paid out of the General Fund of the City of Edmonds.

WHEREAS, by Resolution No. 112, of the City of Edmonds, the City Council of the said City has declared its intention to order the improvement as above outlined and doing all other work in connection therewith necessary to make a complete improvement in accordance with the plans and specifications prepared by the City Engineer.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY OF EDMONDS DOES ORDAIN:

Section 1: That the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds, from a point 27 feet West of Ninth Street to a point 270 feet East of Ninth Street in said City by the construction of a six-inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer, together with the necessary drainage, man holes, catch basins, and other appurtenances necessary to make a complete improvement.

Section 2: That one-half of the costs and expenses of such improvement shall be charged against and paid out of the General Fund of the City of Edmonds, and the remaining one-half of the costs and expenses of such improvement shall be borne by and assessed against the property included in the Assessment District herein created in accordance with law.

Section 3: That there is hereby established a Local Improvement District to be called Local Improvement District No. 56, which District shall include the following described property, to-wit:

Beginning at the Northwest corner of Lot 1, block 68, of the Plat of the City of Edmonds; thence East along the North line of Lots 1 to 9, inclusive, for a distance of 270 feet; thence South along the East line of Lots 9 and 32 of said Block 68, for a distance of 235 feet; thence West along the South line of Lots 32 to 40, inclusive, of said Block 68, for a distance of 270 feet; thence North along the West line of Lot 40 and Lot 1 a distance of 235 feet to the point of beginning, being Lots 1 to 9, inclusive, and Lots 32 to 40, inclusive, in Block 68 in said Plat of the City of Edmonds, Snohomish County, Washington.

Section 4: A special fund is hereby created to be called Local Improvement District Fund No. 56, which shall consist in the aggregate of the several amounts assessed, levied and collected on the several lots and parcels of land in said Local Improvement District and the proceeds of the sale of the bonds of the said district for the purpose of defraying the one-half of the costs and expenses of such improvement chargeable to the property in said District. Out of said fund shall be paid the bonds, the interest thereon and one-half of the entire cost of such improvement.

Section 5: One-half of the costs and expenses of such improvement shall be defrayed by special assessments payable in ten equal annual installments with interest thereon at the rate of five percent (5% per annum under the mode of payment by bonds as provided by law and the Ordinances of said City. Bonds bearing interest at the rate of five per cent (5% per annum payable on or before twelve years from date of issue shall be issued in payment of one-half of the costs and expenses of such improvement, or the City of Edmonds may, at its election, sell said bonds and make payment in cash in the manner provided by the Ordinances of said City
