The Clerk was authorized to write to Paul C. Lawing, that he must submit his plans and specification for installing a septic tank, to comply with the City Ordinance.

Attorney Anderson was authorized to offer \$250 for the property near the South Edmonds water tank.

Street Superintendent Doty reported that the catch basin on seventh and Alder street was filled up and running in the street caused from the sewerage of the J. J. Potter property. A motion was made by Clausen and seconded by Jones that the City objects to this sewerage disposal and is in violation of the City Ordinance. Motion carried.

Water Supt. Doty brought up before the council the reading of the water meters every two months except the business places which would be read every month, because of the shortage of help. The Clerk was asked to contact the Attorney in regard to an ordinance also a zoning ordinance, to protect building near our water wells.

The Council met in regular session with Mayor Fourtner presiding. The roll call showed the following councilmen present Chandler, McGibbon, McDonell, Jones, Savage, Hansen and Clausen.

A motion was made by Savage and seconded by McGibbon that the bills for labor be allowed Ray McKeever \$80 on the water, \$16 on the street fund, Floyd Duncan \$80 on water fund, and the bill of Earl MacDonald for \$15 for special police be allowed but his bill for 7.50 for breaking of his glasses was not allowed. Motion carried.

The plans and specification for a septic tank to be installed near the Yost well, by Paul C. Lawing was presented to the City Council. A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by Savage that this be referred to the Street Committee and the City Engineer.

Water Superintendent Doty reported that the new water tank and tower was practically completed. He also reported that the water department was in need of meters, meter boxes and also copper tubing. A motion was made by Savage and seconded by Clausen that the water superintendent be authorized to purchase 20 meters 20 meter boxes and 800 feet of 3/4 inch copper tubing. Passed by a unanimous vote of the council.

Mr. Ryan came before the Council in regards to getting water to his property, that is about a mile south of our water line. After some discussion Councilman McGibbon stated that we should not sell more water outside of the City until we are sure of enough water for City use.. Councilman Clausen stated that this matter should be taken under consideration. Mayor Fourtner referred this to the water superintendent and committee and the engineer.

Mr. Miller came before the Council and asked that a letter be sent to the Federal government in regards to a housing project in the City of Edmonds. Councilman Savage made a motion that a letter to sent to the Federal Gov. about the critical housing condition, McDonell seconded the motion. McGibbon voted no, and Clausen voted no.

Mayor Fourtner reported he had applications from the following persons the the police job. Carl Perrine, Mr. Montgomery, Mr. Jackson, \$250, Cahn Walsh \$225. Councilman McGibbon suggested getting a temporary <sup>man</sup> and to get some references from the applicants. Councilman Clausen stated that he was in favor of McGibbon's suggestion. A motion was made by Hansen and seconded by McDonell that the Mayor be authorized to employ two policemen. Passed by a unanimous vote of the council.

Mayor Fourtner appointed McDonell, McGibbon and Clausen on a committee to license the different amusements.

A motion was made by Councilman McGibbon and seconded by Savage that an Ordinance be drawn up, if necessary, to have the residence water meters read every two month and the business water meters read every month and bills be sent out every two months. Councilmen Clausen and Chandler stated that they were not in favor of making the change. A vote of the council showed Chandler no, Jones no, Clausen no, McGibbon yes, McDonell yes, Hansen yes Mayor Fourtner vote yes. Councilman Savage did not vote.

The Council met in regular session with Mayor Fourtner presiding. The roll call showed the following councilmen present, Chandler, McGibbon, McDonell, Jones, Savage, Hansen and Clausen.

A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Hansen that the bill from the Federal Pipe and Tank Co. for \$3994.91, which is 85% of the contract for the water tank and tower, be paid. Passed by a unanimous vote of the Council. A motion was made by Clausen and seconded by McGibbon that the bills for labor be paid Ray Mckeever \$92 on the street and \$4 on the water. Motion carried.

A bid was read to the council in regard to fixing First Avenue North, is as follows; Ripping asphalt and dozing to side, approximately 1000 feet on Front Street and approximately 200 feet on adjoining street-----\$475, or Ripping asphalt (located as above) and disposing with carryall Scraper north of Crescent Laundry, between front Street and Great Northern property, as per conversation with Ray Doty-----\$675. A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by Hansen that this matter be tabled. McGibbon remarked that this be made a post-war project.

A motion was made by Clausen and seconded by Jones that the street Superintendent be authorized to purchase enough hot asphalt to make repairs of the black top streets. Motion carried.

Mr. Hall, Astell and Hicks, representing the Chamber of Commerce, came before the Council in regards to the making containers for waste paper, to be placed on the streets between the schools and the stores with several near the stores. It was also brought up to use only the garbage cans. After some discussion a motion was made by Clausen and seconded by Savage that this matter be referred to the street committee. The question was again open for discussion. Mr. Hall stated that the containers would cost around \$1 or \$1.50 for the material to make them, that the High School Students would make them. Councilmen Clausen and Savage recinded their motion. A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by McDonell that the school authorities be authorized to build 15 boxes and present the bill to the City. Motion passed by a unanimous vote of the Council. A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by Savage that the street superintendent purchase the garbage cans. Motion carried.

Water Superintendent R. H. Doty reported he had pulled the pump that is known as the Richmond Beach pump and had installed the new shaft, and it is pumping 60 gallons per minute.

A motion was made by Savage and seconded by Chandler that a bond be purchased for the policeman K. B. Montgomery. Motion carried.

A letter was read from the Railroad Company in which it states that the Company had approved the signals at the two railroad crossings, and they ask to have the restriction of 8 miles per hour in the City limits raised. A motion was made by Savage and seconded by McGibbon that a letter be written acknowledging this letter, and state that the raising of this restriction would be considered when the signals had been installed. Motion carried.

#### ORDINANCE NO 551.

An Ordinance amending Ordinance No. 412 of the City of Edmonds entitled "An Ordinance fixing and establishing the rates to be charged for water furnished by the Municipal Water System".

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS:

Section 1: That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 412 of the City of Edmonds be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1: The rates for water supplied through meters are hereby fixed as follows:

First	800 Cubic feet or less used each month-----	\$2.00
Next	500 Cubic feet, per hundred cubic feet-----	.25
Next	2300 Cubic feet, per hundred cubic feet-----	.18
Next	1500 Cubic Feet, per hundred cubic feet-----	.15
Next	5000 Cubic Feet, per hundred cubic feet-----	.10
All over	10,000 Cubic feet, per hundred cubic feet---	.04

The above specified minimum monthly charge of \$2.00 shall apply to meters of 3/4 inch size and smaller.

For one-inch meters the minimum monthly charge shall be \$2.90. For 1-1/2 and 2 inch meters the minimum monthly charge shall be \$6.00.

A special lawn and garden sprinkling and irrigation rate shall be in force

each year during the months of June, July and August, which shall be equal to one-half of the above regular charges per hundred Cubic feet for quantities of not more than 5,000 Cubic Feet.

For quantities in excess of 5,000 cubic feet the regular rate schedule shall apply. Said special rate shall not apply to the minimum monthly charges, which shall remain as specified in the regular rate schedule.

That all metered water readings of the Edmonds Municipal Water System be made once every two months and such readings shall be apportioned equally between the two months covered thereby and charged for at the foregoing rates."

PASSED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS AND APPROVED THIS 20 day of February, 1945.

A. B. Charpentier came before the Council in regards to getting water to his property, South of the City limits. He stated there would probably be 20 users and they were all willing to pay more than their share to have the water. This was referred to the water committee for consideration.

Clyde Brown came before the council and asked if he could operate a card room in the back part of his barber shop, which he is opening on Main Street. The Council had no objection to this.

A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by Clausen that the Clerk call for bids for a 100 gallon per minute turbine type water pump. Bids to be opened March 20. Passed by a unanimous vote of the council.

Street Superintendent R. H. Doty, <sup>stated</sup> that he needed 100 feet of 3 inch pipe and fittings before completing the fill around the new well, then it would be ready for the installing of the new pump. A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Savage that the water Supt. purchase 100 feet of 3 inch pipe and fittings. Motion carried.

Street Superintendent Doty reported that Mr. Duvall asked for permission to break down the curb in order to make a driveway to his property. He also suggested having some signs made and the crosswalks painted. A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Savage that the Chief of Police have these signs painted and also the crosswalks. Motion carried.

A motion was made by Savage and seconded by Jones that the Clerk notify the property owners on Ninth street that they must connect to the sewer immediately and pay the inspection fee of \$3. Motion carried.

A diagram was presented to the Council for a standard light pole from Victor Long Welding Co. at a price of \$48.50 in lots of 50, which does not include the globe or wiring.

Mr. Chitty and Mr. Wolfe came before the Council in regard to the street lightning. They had made a survey of the City and prepared a map, dividing the City into three districts, business, secondary business and residential, showing the number of lights needed in each district. Mr. Wolfe stated a portion of these lights could be considered, for instance the business district, which would cost \$760 a year more than we are now paying for street lightning. He also stated the Puget Sound Power & Light Co. would use the light poles now in use and furnish any new poles that were needed, also they would furnish the light fixtures and globes and make any replacing of globes when necessary. Mayor Fournier suggested this be taken under consideration at the next meeting of the Council.

A motion was made that the meeting adjourn until Friday evening at 7:30 P.M. September 7, 1945

A roll call vote of the Councilmen showed Chandler, McGibbon, Jones, Savage, Hansen and Clausen, with Mayor Fournier presiding.

Passed by a unanimous vote of the Council

The hearing of Resolution of Intention #113 for sidewalks, curb and gutter along the west side of Fifth street, from Dayton street to the South line of the A. B. Bently property, came up for hearing before the Council. A number of the property owners protested against having this work done. A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Hansen that this be laid over indefinitely. A roll call vote showed Chandler yes, McGibbon no, McDonnell yes, Savage no, and Hansen yes.

There being no one to object to the Assessment Roll for Local Improvement District # 56, a motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Savage that the assessment roll be accepted. A roll call vote showed Chandler yes, McGibbon yes, McDonnell yes, Savage yes and Hansen yes.

#### ORDINANCE NO 553.

AN Ordinance approving and confirming the Assessment and Assessment Roll of Local Improvement District #56 of the City of Edmonds, Snohomish County, Washington, for the improvement of the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds from a point 27 feet West of Ninth Street, in said city, to a point 270 feet East of Ninth Street, in said city, by the construction of a six-inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer, with necessary appurtenances, necessary to make a complete improvement all in accordance with Resolution No. 112, of the City of Edmonds, levying an assessment on account thereof against the several lots, tracts and parcels of land as shown on said Roll, providing for the issuance of Bonds therefor and fixing the date of the issuance thereof.

#### THE CITY OF EDMONDS DOES ORDAIN:

Section 1: That the Assessment and Assessment Roll of Local Improvement District No. 56, for the improvement of the alley in Blocks 77 and 68, Plat of the City of Edmonds, Edmonds, Washington, from a point 27 feet West of Ninth Street, in said city, by the construction of a six-inch lateral sanitary and storm sewer with necessary appurtenances for a complete improvement all in accordance with Resolution No. 112 of the City of Edmonds, as the same now stands, be and the same is hereby in all things approved and confirmed.

Section 2: That each of the lots, tracts and parcels of land, or other property whown on said roll, is hereby declared to be specially benefitted by said improvement in at least the amount charged against the same, and that the assessment appearing against the same is in proportion to the several assessments appearing upon said roll, and there is hereby levied an assessment against each lot, tract, and parcel of land and other property, appearing upon said Roll, the amount finally charged against the same thereon.

Section 3: That the 1st day of January, 1946 is hereby fixed as the date of the issuance of the Bonds required to be issued on account of said improvement.

Section 4: The City of Edmonds may sell said Bonds and make payment in cash in the manner provided by the Ordinances of said City.

Several people from the Baptist Church came before the Council about the water that runs into the basement of the Church. After some discussion a motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Hansen that this be referred to the Street Supt. and the engineer. Motion carried.

Water Supt. Doty reported that a great amount of sand was in the water which comes from the Cook well and that something should be done to prevent this condition. A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by McDonell that the Engineer and Supt. be given the authority to remedy this condition. Motion carried.

Street Supt. reported that Walnut street had been opened up from third to fifth street and the property owners paid the expense of this work. Supt. Doty also reported roots from the willow tree on the Rulaford property had caused the stoppage of the sewer. Mayor Fourtner read a letter from the Rulafords stating they would cut this tree down and thanked the Council for the cooperation given them.

A motion was made by Savage and seconded by McDonell that the Chief of Police salary be raised to \$225 and the Deputy to \$200 per month until the first of the year. A vote of the Council showed Chandler yes, McGibbon yes, McDonell yes, Savage yes and Hansen yes.

Chief of Police Holmquist suggested to the Council that the two city lots on Main street be used for a parking lot, with a flood light. A motion was made by Hansen and seconded by Savage that the Chief of Police and the Superintendent be authorized to fix this lot for a parking lot for cars. Motion carried.

The Clerk was asked to write to Pointer-Williamette in regards to the vacating of the street known as Yost Admiral Way if they no longer need this street.

Section 1. That the City of Edmonds issue emergency warrants in the amount of \$450.00, being the estimated expenditures required to meet the cost of additional salaries necessarily incurred in the Police Department of the City of Edmonds for the remainder of the year 1945.

Section 2: An emergency is hereby declared to exist, with reference to said expenses, which could not reasonably have been foreseen at the time of making the next annual budget.

Section 3: This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect upon its passage and publication as provided by law.
