The Great Northern Railroad is to furnish an agreement and plat to the City and submit it to the Council. A motion was made by Clausen and seconded by Hansen that the City agree to the closing of Bell Street subject to the final approval of the City Council. a roll call vote showed Chandler yes, McGibbon yes, Siefert yes, Hansen yes and Clausen yes.

A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by Siefert that we adopt the resolution for paying the Fireman's Insurance . Motion carried.

H. J. Johnson came before the council in regards to getting the hydrant replaced at tenth and Maple streets. This was referred to the street committee.

Mrs. Clara Strance, chairman of the Library Board introduced Miss Reynolds who spoke to the Council in regards to the signing of a contract with the Rural County Library District which states that the City agrees to pay the sum of money equal to the millage levied for rural county library purposes, multiplied by the assessed valuation of property within the limits of the city. The City is to provide suitable quarters for the library, heat, light and janitor service without cost to the Board. ORDINANCE NO 555.

An Ordinance providing for the enrollment of the Volunteer Firemen of the City of Edmonds under the relief and compensation provisions of the Volunteer Firemen's Relief Fund Act of the State of Washington providing that any of said Firemen may enroll under the pension provisions of said Act and providing for the collection and payment of Volunteer Firemen's Relief Fund fees.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS:

Section 1: The Volunteer Fire Department of the City of Edmonds shall not exceed twenty-five (25) Firemen for each one thousand population, of fraction thereof, and in no event shall said Fire Department comprise less than fifteen (15) Firemen.

Section 2: All of the members of the Volunteer Fire Department of the City of Edmonds are hereby enrolled under the relief and compensation provisions of the Volunteer Firemen's Relief Fund Act of the State of Washington set forth in Sections 9578-15 to 9578-39 Remington's Revised Statutes of Washington for the purpose of providing protection for said Firemen and their families from death or disability arising in the performance of their duties as Firemen.

Section 3: Any member of the Volunteer Fire Department of the City of Edmonds may enroll under the Pension provisions of said Volunteer Firemen's Relief Fund Act for the purpose of enabling any such Fireman so electing to avail himself of the retirement provisions of said Act.

Section 4: An annual fee of Three Dollars (\$3.00) for each member of said Fire Department shall be paid by the City of Edmonds for the purpose of affording the members of said Fire Department with protection from death or disability as in said Act provided.

Section 5: An annual fee of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) shall be collected and paid for each Fireman electing to enroll under the pension or retirement provisions of said Act, Thirteen Dollars (\$13.00) of which shall be paid by the City of Edmonds, and Twelve Dollars (\$12.00) of which shall be paid by the Fireman so enrolling.

ORDINANCE NO. 556

An Ordinance providing for the licensing and regulation of pool, billiard, and card tables, so-called games of skill, juke boxes and automatic music machines and punch boards, and providing penalties for the violation thereof.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: From and after the effective date of this Act the license fee for keeping and operating any billiard or pool table, within the City of Edmonds, is hereby fixed at the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) per year for each table, All such license fees shall expire on December 31st each year, and such license taken out after July 1st shall be Two Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$2.50) for the remainder of the year.

Section 2: The license fee for keeping and operating any card table, in the City of Edmonds, is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) per year for each table. All such license shall expire on December 31st each year, and such license taken out after July 1st shall be Twelve Dollars and Fifty Cents (\$12.50) for the remainder of the year.

Section 3: The license fee for keeping and operating any automatic amusement game, so-called games of skill, juke boxes or other automatic music machines, in the City of Edmonds, shall be Twelve Dollars (\$12.00) per year for each such game or machine. All such licenses shall expire on December 31st each year, and all such license taken out after July 1st shall be \$6.00 for the remainder of the year.

Section 4: The license fee for each punch board operated within the City of Edmonds shall be Fifty Cents (\$0.50).

Section 5: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to operate any such pool table, billiard table, card table, automatic game or so-called game of skill, juke box or other automatic music machine or punch board, within the City of Edmonds, without having first procured a license from the City Clerk of said City so to do, and having paid the amount of such license into the Treasury of the City of Edmonds.

Section 6: Every person, firm or corporation found guilty of violating any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed One Hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or by confinement in the City Jail for not more than ten (10) days or by both such fine and imprisonment. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

A motion was made by Chandler and seconded by Hansen that lots 25, 26 and 27 in Block 40 be sold to Samuel Drobner for \$40 a lot. A roll call vote showed Chandler yes, Hansen yes, McGibbon yes, Siefert yes and Clausen yes.

and such other work as may be necessary to make a complete improvement; providing that the payment for said improvement be made by special assessment on the property in said improvement district under the mode of payment by bonds for material used, fixed estimate, and all other expenses, except that forty per cent of the cost of paving, including the preparation for paving, shall be paid by the City of Edmonds from the General Fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS:

1. That it is the intention of the City Council of the City of Edmonds, Washington, to improve Front Street from Main Street North to the City Limits; to improve Second Street from Main Street to Edmonds Street; to improve Fifth Street from Bell Street to Edmonds Street; to improve Bell Street from Front Street to Fifth Street; to improve Edmonds Street from Front Street to Sixth Street; to improve Daley Street from Third Street to Seventh Street and to improve Glen Street from Sixth Street to Seventh Street by grading and leveling the above described streets and paving said Streets with a bituminous road type paving mix together with the installation, along said Streets, of standard curbs and gutters where such do not presently exist, and such other work as may be necessary to make a complete improvement.

All persons who may desire to object to the improvement herein mentioned are hereby notified to appear at the Council Chambers in the City Hall, in the City of Edmonds, Washington, at a meeting of the said Council on the 16th day of July, 1946, at the hour of eight o'clock P. M. of said day, then and there to present their objections thereto, if any they have.

4. The City Engineer of said City of Edmonds, is hereby directed to submit to the City Council, at or prior to said 16th day of July 1946, the estimated cost and expense of the improvement, in this resolution mentioned, and a statement of the proportionate amount thereof which shall be borne by the property within the proposed Improvement District; and a statement of the aggregate assessed valuation of the real estate, exclusive of improvement, within said proposed Improvement District according to the valuation last placed upon it for General taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts or parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited thereby, and the estimated amount of the cost and expense of such improvement to be borne by each lot, tract, parcel of land, or other property.

2 That the cost and expense of all materials required to make a complete improvement, the fixed estimate and all other expenses of every kind shall be established embracing as near as may be all the property specially benefited by such improvement, and such specially benefited property shall be assessed to pay for the entire cost of such improvement, except forth (40%)

per-cent of the cost of paying and the preparation for paving shall be paid by the City of Edmonds from the General Fund.

3. All persons who may desire to object to the improvement herein mentioned are hereby notified to appear at the Council Chambers in the City Hall in the City of Edmonds, Washington, at a meeting of the said Council on the 16th day July 1946, at the hour of eight o'clock P. M. of said day, then and there to present their objections thereto, if any they have.

ORDINANCE NO. 562

An Ordinance providing for the licensing and regulation of Taxi-cabs and for-hire passenger vehicles in the City of Edmonds and providing penalties for the violation thereof.

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS;

Section 1: From and after the effective date of this Ordinance the license fee for operating any taxi-cabs and for-hire passenger vehicles is hereby fixed at the sum of Twenty-five Dollars (\$25.00) per year for each taxi-cab of for-hire passenger vehicle so operated. All such license fees shall expire on December 31st each year and such license taken out after July 1st shall be Fifteen Dollars (\$15.00) for the remainder of the year. All applications for such taxi-cab or for-hire passenger vehicle licenses shall be in writing signed by the applicant and filed with the City Clerk who shall issue such licenses.

Section 2: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to operate any taxi-cab or for-hire passenger vehicle in the City of Edmonds without having first procured a license from the City Clerk of said City so to do and having paid the amount of such license into the treasury of the City of Edmonds.

Section 3: No such taxi-cab or for-hire passenger vehicle shall be operated in the City of Edmonds by one other than a duly licensed and qualified motor vehicle driver under the laws of the State of Washington.

Section 4: No taxi-cab or for-hire passenger vehicle shall be permitted to stand or park except when loading and unloading passengers other than in one of the following passenger vehicle zones;

- (a) one on the East side of Fifth Street between Main and Dayton Streets in front of Engel's Tavern;
- (b) One on the South side of Dayton Street immediately East of the property line of Fifth Street;
- (c) One on Front Street immediately south of the property line of Main Street;

and said taxi-cab or fir-hire passenger vehicle zones shall be set aside exclusively for the use of such licensed vehicles, and shall be suitably marked by the Police Department of the City.

Section 5: Not more than four licenses shall be issued and outstanding at any time for taxi-cab or for-hire passenger vehicles in the City of Edmonds. Said licensed taxi-cabs shall be assigned to their respective stands or zones, as above established, by the Mayor.

Section 6: It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to park any automobile or other vehicle in the space provided for such taxi-cab stands as provided for herein.

Section 7: Every person, firm or corporation found guilty of violating any of the terms or provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not to exceed One hundred Dollars (\$100.00) or by confinement in the City Jail for not more than ten (10) days or by both such fine and imprisonment.

This Ordinance shall take effect and be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as provided by law.

AN ORDINANCE adopting and levying the General Taxes for the City of Edmonds, Washington, for the fiscal year commencing January 1st, 1947, on all property, both real and personal, in said City, subject to taxation for the purpose of raising sufficient revenue to carry on the several departments of said City for the ensuing year as required by law; appropriating the same to the several funds for said fiscal year, and providing for the collection thereof.

WHEREAS the City Council of the City of Edmonds, State of Washington, having heard all persons asking to be heard for and against the preliminary budget, heretofore adopted for the ensuing year, due notice having been given as required by law and now this 7th day of October 1946, final budget having been adopted and the Council having determined the amount necessary to be paid on the current assessment roll as general taxes for the ensuing year and appropriating the same as in this ordinance described, therefore;

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That there be and there is hereby levied on all real and personal property of the City of Edmonds, subject to taxation therein, a general tax for municipal purposes for the ensuing year commencing January 1st, 1947, the sum of \$12,416.60.

A motion was made by Waggoner and seconded by Siefert that a letter be sent to Pointer-Williamette Co. thanking them for they assistance that has been extended to the City. Motion carried.

A check was received from D. P. Dennisten for lots 28 and 29 in Block D. A motion was made by Clausen and seconded by Chandler that the City sell lots 28 and 29 in Block D for \$3000. A roll call vote showed Chandler yes, McGibbon yes, Waggoner no, Siefert no, McGinness yes and Clausen yes.

A motion was made by McGinness and seconded by McGibbon that we purchase two lots east of the Masonic Hall on Dayton from Jessye Cogswell for \$1000. A roll call vote showed a unanimous vote of the council.

Mr. Pike reported to the council that the hedge in back of the Methodist Church had grown out into the alley, making it impossible for cars to get through. This was referred to the street committee to investigate and report at the next council meeting.

The Clerk read the comments of the State Examiners report to the Council. A motion was made by McGibbon and seconded by Waggoner that the finance committee look over this report and make a report to the council on it. Motion carried.

There being no further business the meeting adjourned.

Ordinance No. 564.

An Ordinance vacating the West one hundred twenty (120) feet of the alley in Block 121, Plat of the City of Edmonds, Snohomish County, Washington.

WHEREAS, the owners of more than two-thirds of the private property abutting upon that portion of the alley hereinafter described, in the City of Edmonds, duly filed their Petition with the City Council of the City of Edmonds, praying for the vacation of said alley; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the said City did by Resolution duly adopted fix the 5th day of November, 1946 at the hour of eight o'clock P. M. of said day for the hearing and determination of said Petition; and

WHEREAS, due and legal notice of the time and place of hearing and determination on said petition has been duly given by the City Clerk as required by law; and

WHEREAS, it appearing to the City Council that the said Petition should be granted and the said Council does hereby determine to vacate said portion of such alley; now, therefore,

THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EDMONDS DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1: That the West one hundred twenty (120) feet of the alley in Block 121, Plat of the City of Edmonds, Edmonds, Snohomish County, Washington, be and the same is hereby vacated as a public alley.
